## Parks and Recreation July 2017 PRAB Report

#### **Community Center Discussion With County—Update**

The Mayor and Council endorsed moving forward with a joint master plan to include the Willard Center, Jorgenson Lab and Sherwood Center for a future joint facility to include a community center. On June 28 the Mayor and Council meet with the Board of Supervisors and they too supported the joint effort.

#### Background

The County has contracted with Lemay Erickson to conduct a master plan for the Willard Center and it may be desirous for the City to join in the discussion and master plan exercise.

#### Master Plan Components

Allow the Willard, Jorgenson Lab and Sherwood Center sites to be considered as one campus with no parcel boundaries.

Allow for proposed programs to be located on City or County property for most efficient layouts.

Allow for expansion/connection between Willard and Sherwood with required separation between uses.

Allow shared campus parking with surface parking or structured parking.

Allow improved ingress/egress throughout the sites.

City would contribute \$33,000 for the master plan and work directly with the County and Lemay Erickson.

#### Van Dyck Master Plan Update

The Van Dyck Master Plan Advisory Group met on June 29th. Concept 2 received the most positive feedback and the group worked on making a few modifications. The group discussed the skate park location, playgrounds, parking, the stream restoration and living learning lab, shelters and family restrooms and public art. Cost estimating will also be completed to help with the funding and phasing recommendations.

#### City Embraces New Logomark, Brand, To Accompany City Seal

The City of Fairfax has introduced a new logomark and tagline, Live Life Connected, to strengthen the city's identity and help streamline communications imaging for promotional purposes.

Generally speaking, the new logomark and the wording "Fairfax City" will be used for economic development, promotional campaigns, marketing, special events, and cultural arts. Look for it at these events and on promotional materials. It also may appear on the city website in these instances. Guidelines will be posted on the city website in July.

The city will use the tagline Live Life Connected in its promotional materials, and social media users are encouraged to use #LiveLifeConnected regarding the city.

The logomark consolidates other promotional imagery previously used by the city — and compliments the City of Fairfax seal, adopted in 1973.

The seal will continue to be used on legal and official documents and communications from the City of Fairfax government, the Mayor and City Council, city boards and commissions, and city staff. Additionally, public safety offices will continue to use the police department and fire department shields.

All city logos, seals and shields are owned by the city, and cannot be used except by the city without express permission.

#### **Specialty Camps 2017**
