
HB 2

- Signed into law in 2014
- Requires the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) to develop a prioritization process for making funding decisions for the Six Year Program (SYIP)
- HB 1887 reallocated SYIP funding to make it subject to HB 2


HB 1887

- Revised construction allocation formula
- Repealed primary, secondary and urban formula funding
 - Jurisdictions received funding automatically
- Established new formula
 - 45% State of Good Repair
 - 27.5% High Priority Projects
 - 27.5% Construction District Grants Program
- CTB allocates funding using HB 2 criteria
 Jurisdictions apply for the funding

Process Overview

- CTB has increased funding authority through SB1887
- CTB required to allocated funding via HB2 criteria
- HB2 first level screen is conformance with VTrans 2040

VTrans2040

- In order to qualify for HB2 funding, projects must be listed in VTrans2040.
- VTrans2040 is the long-range statewide multimodal policy plan for transportation in Virginia.
- First statewide plan to incorporate performance based planning
 - Goal is to provide common framework for funding decisions


Project Eligibility

- Projects considered for funding have to meet a transportation need as defined in VTrans for one of three priority areas:
 - Corridor of Statewide Significance: inter-regional
 - Regional Network: intra-regional
 - Urban Development Area: local activity center
- Cities are eligible to submit projects under any of these priority areas

Corridors of Statewide Significance

- There are 12 COSS in Virginia
 - Corridor has multiple modes or is an extended freight corridor
 - Connects regions, states & major activity centers
 - High volume of travel
 - Provides unique statewide function
- Two COSS run through the City of Fairfax
 - Northern Virginia Connector (I–66)
 - Seminole Corridor (Route 29)

Corridors of Statewide Significance



Regional Networks

- Multimodal networks that facilitate intraregional travel
- Fill in the gap between COSS and Urban Development Areas (next slide)
- New concept introduced in VTrans2040
- Still being defined

Urban Development Areas


- Statewide designation that localities use to define areas for future population growth and development
- Regulated by Section 15.2–2223.1 of the State Code
- Require certain development density and principles of traditional neighborhood design
- 77 UDAs in the State (none in the City)

Urban Development Areas

- In order for localities to qualify for HB2 funding under UDA category, they must modify their Comprehensive Plans before October 1, 2015
- State is allowing a more flexible definition of UDAs for HB2 purposes
- Designate "UDA-like" designated growth areas
- Allows flexibility for funding options without imposing UDA requirements

Urban Development Areas

- Mixed Use areas on Future Land Use Map are "UDA-like"
- Need to include language in Comp Plan that these areas "meet the intent of Section 15.2-2223.1"
- Oct 1 Deadline



Process Overview

- CTB has funding authority through SB1887
- CTB required to allocated funding via HB2 criteria
- HB2 first level screen is conformance with Vtrans 2040
- HB2 scores projects based on other factors

HB 2 Prioritization Process

- Weighting varies by state district
- Congestion Mitigation required to be the highest weighted factor in Northern Virginia (and Hampton Roads)
 - Congestion Mitigation (45%)
 - Economic Development (5%)
 - Accessibility (15%)
 - Safety (5%)
 - Environmental Quality (10%)
 - Land Use and Transportation Coordination (20%)

HB 2 application cycle

- July: HB2 application training sessions
- August: VTrans Completion
- August: CTB call for Projects under HB2
- October: Comprehensive Plan Amendment Deadline
- October: HB2 Applications Due

- University Drive extension to Eaton Place
- Fairfax Circle
- Fairfax Boulevard Master Plan Implementation
- Government Center Parkway extension to Jermantown Road
- Downtown Street Network Expansion
- Kamp Washington Street Network Expansion
- Old Lee Highway Implementation
- Bike/Ped Projects (Citywide)
