Dog Park Update

Dog park construction starts September 17th. Utilities Unlimited will be performing the work. It is expected to take 4-6 weeks to complete. Thanks to Affectionate Petcare, Long Fence will be installing the perimeter fence. With the assistance of Public Works we will be repaving the circle and the upper parking lot prior to opening. We are looking towards a November grand opening. More details to follow.

George Snyder Trail Update

City staff has selected a firm and is working on a scope of work and pricing for the engineering and design plan. The review has taken longer than anticipated due to the complexity of project and the desire to do a not to exceed contract. The cost proposal will need to be reviewed by VDOT and then approved by City Council at a later meeting. We have determined that the trail can go under Rt. 50 however, this expands the project scope and therefore we need to determine if there will be adequate funding to include.

We had a great summer for 2018! Our traditional summer camp ended on August 10th and we ended the summer with 2 week of specialty camps and Last Blast camp at the Sherwood Center. We offer a variety of specialty camps for all ages which include—soccer, art, cooking, STEM lego, and skate boarding. These camps range from full day to half day programs, and are run at Van Dyck Park and in the Sherwood Center. Our Last Blast Program was also popular—which is a continuation of our traditional day camp with combined ages we were able to offer this pro-




INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION
