Fairfax City and Lamb Center Launch Day-Work Program to **Employ Those Experiencing Homelessness**

It's a refrain heard in countless municipalities across America: How can we help those experiencing homelessness and provide a financial step-up?

Enter an innovative pilot program — launching later this month in Fairfax City that will address both homelessness and an individual's financial viability and dignity.

Managed by the staff at the Lamb Center — a nonprofit that serves the poor and those experiencing homelessness in Fairfax and Northern Virginia — in coordination with the city's Parks and Recreation Department, the program will run for 16 weeks. Here's how it works:

- The day-work program will enable eight to 10 Lamb Center guests to work two days per week for four-hour shifts at city-designated work sites.
- The Lamb Center will register program participants, provide transportation, supervise job sites and pay workers in cash at the end of each shift (workers will earn \$10 per hour).
- Fairfax City will provide the Lamb Center clients learning opportunities and a pathway back into the work force.

The new day-work program is funded by a \$15,000 grant from Fairfax City to the Lamb Center. The pilot is modeled after "There's a Better Way," a successful initiative in Albuquerque, N.M.

The program will begin on November 8th. Details have been finalized with the Lamb Center and our Parks Division. We are looking forward to helping provide an opportunity to serve our community while getting service at the same time.

City/County Willard/Sherwood Community Center Update

City and County officials met on October 24th to discuss the continued Willard/ Sherwood partnership. Both agreed to a shared goal of working toward a new Willard Center that will include 34,000 square feet of community center space attached to the Sherwood Center. Underground and surface parking would be included. Specific goals for the next six months is to:

- Determine financing model and agreement for the capital expense
- Determine operational and maintenance responsibilities
- Prepare interior space plan
- Develop the joined site plan in more detail.

\$100,000 has been earmarked in the FY20 CIP for this work.
