





Old Town Map




Future Land Use Map

Hydraulic Small Area Plan


Background Analysis

- City of Fairfax Design Guidelines


2035 Comprehensive Plan

- Written in conjunction with City staff, City Council, the Planning Commission and the overall community and approved on February 12, 2019
- Describes the vision for City-wide physical growth and development in the near future and serves as a policy document for decision-making that informs zoning and budget decisions
- Provides guidance on land use, transportation, housing, economic development, environment, public facilities, parks, arts, and historic preservation




Vision Fairfax Mason

- Three-day charrette (November 6-8, 2014) hosted by the City and George Mason University that explored the connectivity, livability, and sustainability between Mason and Old Town
- Charrette participants provided input on housing, land use and transportation, multimodal transportation (including pedestrians and bicycles), economic development and retail, the arts, and town/gown relations
- Consultant helped facilitate meetings and prepared summary report




Fairfax 2020 Commission Report

- 1992 report developed in conjunction with residents, businesses, and community representatives, organized into sub-committees
- Provides City-wide guidance on economic development, land use, town/gown relations (Mason and NOVA), transportation, the environment, community appearance, housing, education, social services, recreation and culture, and public services and utilities




City of Fairfax Old Town Fairfax Revitalization Plan (aka: "Phipps Report")

- 1989 report developed for the City by a team of consultants (Phipps Group-led)
- Proposes a development program for Old Town revitalization by addressing rehabilitation and development, land use, traffic management and parking, and design and public improvements



City of Fairfax Design Guidelines

- Developed by consultants and adopted July 24, 2018
- Establishes architectural and design standards for new and rehabilitated construction within the Historic Overlay District, Transition Overlay District, and Architectural Control Overlay District




Recurring Themes for Key Recommendations

- Land Use Support land planning that regulates a mix of land uses and composition; breaks up blocks to a walkable scale; and balances connectivity for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists.
- Landscaping and Streetscape Streetscapes and outdoor spaces should be attractively designed and furnished.
- Housing The City should add new housing at more urban densities where appropriate.
- Preservation Prevent and reverse deterioration of existing Old Town development in accordance with applicable design guidelines.

Recurring Themes for Key Recommendations

- Multimodal Transportation Enhance safety for all road users, expand the existing street grid, and support non-motorized forms of transportation.
- Sustainability and Environment Consider implementing innovative pilot initiatives that advance new technologies.
- Economic Development —Target top-tier commercial tenants and a wide variety of patrons and encourage redevelopment of underutilized properties.
- Parks & Recreation and the Arts Enhance Old Town Square as a destination for events and identify locations for either temporary or permanent performing arts venues.






Rust Curve Sidewalk




