

### New Park Supervisor—Arborist

Christopher Fleming, a certified arborist, recently started as a Park Supervisor. Chris has a degree from VCU in environmental science. He has previously worked in his families landscaping and tree service business and as a plant and tree specialist at Merrifield Garden Center. We are very excited to have a practicing arborist and plant specialist working for us. He will provide much needed expertise in our tree canopy and planting beds. He will also be working with the our Sustainability Coordinator on an Urban Tree Management Plan. This is a big step for the city as it will involve a tree inventory and recommendations for improving our tree canopy.

We will also be working with the Environmental Sustainability Committee on an invasive management program using volunteers with help and guidance from Chris.
