

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

It is with great pride and gratitude that I present to you the 2023 Annual Report of the City of Fairfax Police Department. As your Chief of Police, it is both an honor and a privilege to lead a dedicated team of law enforcement professionals who are committed to serving and protecting our community. This annual report highlights some of our major accomplishments during 2023.

Crime Prevention and Public Safety

As a police department, we exist to help our residents, visitors, and business community be and feel safer today than they were yesterday. As such, preventing, investigating, and otherwise addressing crime concerns continues to be our main focus. During 2023, we implemented many new proactive policing strategies and innovations to work toward this goal. Our photo speed enforcement program, crisis response team, and motor carrier safety program are just a few examples of these efforts that you will read about in this report. We plan to continue developing such initiatives and innovations through 2024 and beyond.

Community Engagement and Partnership

Throughout the past year, we continued to build on our strong legacy of community engagement and partnership. Our community meeting, held in late 2023, connected us with over 70 participants and numerous community organizations, who provided valuable feedback about crime trends and community concerns. Our *Lock-Take-Hide, Stop the Spread of Misinformation, Anti-Scammer,* and *How to Stay Informed* campaigns helped community members become partners in identifying and reducing crime. And the Chief's Advisory Council (CAC), which meets monthly, was and continues to be an indispensable venue for sharing information and soliciting feedback with key community partners.

Accountability and Transparency

Our Department's core values describe how we hold ourselves accountable to the high standard expected of us by the community. These values are *excellence*, *partnership*, *integrity* and *compassion*. Our values form the acronym EPIC, which is a word used to describe something above and beyond the usual or ordinary. I believe each member of our police department meets this definition in the way they protect and serve our community members during each interaction.

This annual report is a testament to our dedication to the highest standard of public service. It is also a tool to promote transparency about our initiatives, achievements, and challenges. I am grateful for our police department and community members, who continue to make the City of Fairfax a safe place to live, work, and visit.



PROFESSIONAL EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP SCHOOL (PELS)

The Professional Executive Leadership School (PELS) is an intensive three-week leadership education program conducted in cooperation with the University of Richmond. FBI NATIONAL ACADEMY

The FBI National Academy is an 11-week course focused on advanced communication, leadership, and fitness training. It provides coursework in intelligence theory, terrorism and terrorist mindsets, management science, law, behavioral science, law enforcement communication, and forensic science. It serves to improve the administration of justice in police departments and agencies at home and abroad and to raise law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation worldwide.

D.C. POLICE LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

The three-week program emphasized leadership in crisis situations, effective media relations, and the legal and constitutional aspects of policing. A significant focus was placed on innovations in law enforcement, including the exploration of technological advancements and their impact. The curriculum included detailed case studies of specific, high-profile events, providing real-world context and learning opportunities. Additionally, the training emphasized the development of a growth mindset, strategies for fostering organizational wellness, and the importance of understanding and managing stress, burnout, and resilience.

In December 2023, WRAP hosted its 26th Annual Law Enforcement Awards, recognizing 17 officers in the Washington Metropolitan area for their commitment to fight against drunk driving. 
HEALTH & WELLNESS




Cover the Cruiser



ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES


The Administrative Services Division oversees numerous areas that support the mission of law enforcement, including the Emergency Communications Center, Records Management, Property and Evidence, Information Technology, and the Public Information Office.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The Emergency Communications Center is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and receives tens of thousands of emergency and non-emergency calls every year.

As part of its community policing philosophy, we encourage the community to call the police concerning suspicious activity and suspected criminal activity.

RECORDS

The records section is a vital part of the overall operation of the Police Department and serves as the entry point for the public's customer service needs. Records personnel are responsible for the management and retention of the department's official law enforcement records. In addition to records management, this section is also responsible for tracking summonses and arrest warrants issued in the City and providing police and accident reports.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

New systems, new equipment, and rising demands have brought significant change to law enforcement. Law enforcement must continue to

innovate and adopt new technology to continue to efficiently protect and serve the community.

PUBLIC INFORMATION

Our Public Information Office is responsible for the weekly crime report, social media content, communications with media outlets, and all other public communications that represent the police department. The Public Information Office also responds to Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests and court orders requesting police documents. The Public Information Office processed 253 FOIA requests in 2023.

Homicide

On June 10, 2023, detectives responded to 9715 Fairfax Blvd. for a report of a deceased male subject behind the business. Detectives immediately began to investigate the incident and were able to identify a person of interest with video footage and interviews.

The suspect was tried in 2024 and convicted of 2nd degree murder.

Malicious Wounding

On May 15, 2023, patrol officers responded to the scene of an active assault at Rep. Gerry Connolly's office, 10680 Main St. #140. Patrol officers were able to detain a suspect on scene. Detectives conducted follow-up interviews, scene processing, and served several search warrants. Also involved in this case were the United States Capitol Police and the FBI Washington Field Office.

Two staffers were injured in this incident. The suspect was charged with felony aggravated malicious

wounding and malicious wounding. This case is expected to be heard in 2024.

Obtaining Money by False Pretenses/ Impersonating a LE Officer

In June 2023, reports were taken by patrol officers and detectives regarding a person claiming to be a law enforcement officer requesting money to take care of and remove official court paperwork. In total, victims lost \$70,000.

Detectives investigated and obtained four felony obtaining money by false pretense and four misdemeanor impersonating a law enforcement officer warrants. The suspect was arrested in Georgia and extradited back to Virginia in January 2024.

Bank Robbery


On April 29, 2023, detectives responded to bank robbery at Sandy Spring Bank involving a firearm. Several items were collected from the crime scene, and further investigation revealed that the suspects were also involved in a series of bank robberies in the DMV area.

Suspects were captured in Maryland where they are currently incarcerated. The suspects are awaiting trial in Maryland and will be extradited to Virginia to be tried.

Shooting

In December 2022, detectives investigated a shooting along Fairfax Blvd. where a firearm was discharged from a moving vehicle, striking a vehicle moving in the opposite direction, and a vehicle moving in the same direction. Several search warrants were executed for electronic data leading to additional leads. An arrest was made in May 2023.

The suspect pleaded guilty in December 2023 to shooting from a vehicle.

MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY INSPECTION PROGRAM

The City of Fairfax has a large number of commercial motor vehicles that traverse our roadways. In 2022, MPO Brabble and MPO Lawlor were certified as commercial motor carrier inspectors. Both conduct comprehensive inspections throughout the year on commercial motor vehicles to ensure that the vehicles are safe to operate on the roadways. These inspections are essential for the safety of all motorists and residents in the City of Fairfax.






TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT


MOTOR VEHICLE DATA



PARKING ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

The department employs one full-time and one part-time parking enforcement official (PEO) to enforce Virginia and City of Fairfax parking laws and handle inoperable vehicle cases. In 2023, PEOs handled 43 inoperable vehicle cases and issued 2,498 parking summonses.

SPEED CAMERA ENFORCEMENT

In late 2022, the City of Fairfax implemented seven photo speed cameras in school zones within the City of Fairfax. The purpose of these cameras is to reduce reckless driving and speeding in school zones during student arrival and dismissal. VA code § 46.2-882.1 and City of Fairfax code 98-22 permit the City of Fairfax Police to use speed enforcement cameras during active construction zones and school crossing zones during students arrival and dismissal. The photo speed camera technicians issued 34,800 citations in 2023.








2023 USE OF FORCE

The CFPD responded to 18,074 calls for service in 2023. Of those calls, only 0.2% resulted in a use of force, which equates to one incident in every 462 calls for service.



To assist with the increased mental health calls for service, the City of Fairfax Police teamed up with the City of Fairfax Fire Department and the City of Fairfax Office of Human Services to create the Community Response Team. The team is made up of one police officer, one paramedic, and one mental health clinician. Each member has extensive training in mental health. The team responds to calls involving a person who is possibly experiencing a mental health crisis. The team provides de-escalation assistance and mental health resources to citizens who are in need. The Community Response Team responded to 214 calls for service from August-December 2023.

DRONE PROGRAM





Over the years the City of Fairfax Police has seen the value and benefits of using drones. The City of Fairfax has joined the Regional Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) Unit. The Regional UAS Unit consists of several local police and sheriff's departments. Each month the Regional UAS Unit comes together to train and educate. The jurisdictions within the Regional UAS Unit have developed partnerships and assist one another during critical incidents or large-scale events. Unmanned drones have assisted officers with missing persons searches, large outdoor event monitoring, and searches for outstanding suspects. MPO Mills has met the strict requirements to be the City of Fairfax Police Department's first drone pilot.

EXPANDED K-9 PROGRAM



In 2023, the City of Fairfax Police Department saw a need to broaden its K-9 program to be more versatile. Our department now utilizes a Bloodhound K-9 and an Explosive Ordinance Detection K-9 (EOD). All of the City of Fairfax Police Department's K-9s provide mutual aid to neighboring jurisdictions when requested.

K-9 BLOODHOUND PROGRAM

PFC Fettig was chosen to be the department's first K-9 Bloodhound handler. K-9 Handler Fettig and her Bloodhound, Rosie, are trained to track critically missing and endangered citizens. PFC Fettig and K-9 Rosie train weekly to perfect their tracking skills. PFC Fettig and K-9 Rosie provide mutual aid to neighboring jurisdictions when requested.



K-9 EXPLOSIVE ORDINANCE DETECTION PROGRAM



PFC Anderson was chosen to be the department's first K-9 Explosive Ordinance Detection handler. PFC Anderson and his Labrador Retriever, K-9 Magnolia, completed the CIA's Agency's 10-week Canine Explosive Ordinance Detection Course. PFC Anderson and K-9 Magnolia are trained to locate explosive devices during search warrants and before large-scale events. PFC Anderson and K-9 Magnolia provide mutual aid to neighboring jurisdictions when requested.
