The 2022 recipient is **Robert Golden**, for his passion for the arts that energizes everyone around him. The opportunities he created for local artists and the endeavors he supported continue to infuse our City with freshness.

The **Business for the Arts Award** was established in 2014 and is granted to businesses who have made significant contributions to the advancement of the arts in the City of Fairfax community. This impact will

directly affect the citizens of the City. Past recipients include, Twins Ace Hardware and Kimco Reality Corporation. The 2022 recipient is **Mara Hair & Mode Studio** Through their business, they have generously brought various disciplines of art and creativity to members of the City's community.
