







ast year, the City of Fairfax
Commission on the Arts solicited designs for an indoor
recycled art project called *The Plastic*Cap Mural. The art project was
conceived as a way to encourage
residents to recycle and make a
positive difference in the world.

The winning design was submitted by local artists Monica Tucker-Harley and Sarah Berry, who were drawn to the project and the eco-awareness theme because nature informs their work. Their mural, *Renew*, made up of 3,000 colorful plastic caps and lids, has been installed on an interior wall at the Green Acres Center.

The artists applied for the project through Persimmon Project, which was founded by Berry to produce murals that pair art and biology to create lasting aesthetic and educational placemaking. Tucker-Harley and Berry have been working together since 2016 when they met during an exhibition by the Art Connection in the Capitol Region at the Pozez Jewish Community Center of Northern Virginia's Bodzin Art Gallery. Tucker-Harley was an ACCR board member, and Berry is the gallery curator.

Tucker-Harley and Berry say they feel extremely fortunate to work well together. "Good partners are hard to find, and we did," they said. Both artists have shared their artwork in galleries around the country. The previous mural, *Love and Unity,* is on display inside the Manassas Mall.

Renew measures 12-foot by 4-foot and consists of three 4-foot-square wood panels. Caps and lids were sourced from the community at collection sites arranged by the Commission on the Arts, along with caps Tucker-Harley had left over from a mural her Girl Scout Brownie troop continued on page 6

Personal Property Tax Payments Due Oct. 5

Stormwater Utility Fee Appeals

The new Stormwater Utility fee equitably distributes the cost of the city's stormwater management services across eligible properties based on the amount of impervious cover. The SWU fee is assessed on every eligible property in the city. Residential and non-residential properties with at least 500 square feet of impervious cover are assessed a SWU fee.

Property owners may request an adjustment to the fee by submitting an appeal application within 30 calendar days after the date the bill is mailed or otherwise issued. Grounds for an adjustment of the fee are limited and must be approved by the director of Public Works.

One example of an appeal or adjustment would be for a woodslatted deck that is built over ground cover that allows for rainwater absorption. Once an appeal is approved, the updated billing unit information will be carried forward each year and property owners would not need to reapply. Managing Grass Clippings

Blowing grass clippings into the street, against the curb, or into storm drains,

channels, and inlets can cause problems, such as:

- Backups and flooding due to clogged stormwater structures
- Poor water quality in our streams
- An unkempt look that some community members find objectionable

Improper disposal of grass clippings is considered an illicit discharge in the City Code and can be referred to the Fire Marshal's office for enforcement.

To help keep our storm drains clear and our neighborhoods clean, please place grass clippings in a paper yard waste bag or a reusable container for curbside collection. (Yard waste set out in plastic bags or in loose piles will not be collected.) Info: fairfaxva.gov (search "refuse")

IN THE CITY

Fairfax Village in the City was created in response to social isolation and other challenges faced by older city residents and those with disabilities during the COVID-19 pandemic. The city's effort is part of a nationwide Village Movement started in 2002, when a group of older neighbors in Boston organized to help each other stay in their homes as they aged.

The mission of Fairfax Village in the City, a joint effort of city staff and community volunteers, is "to help residents ages 55 and older and those with disabilities to age in place within the City of Fairfax community. To that end, the Village works to build personal connections between neighbors, share useful information, and facilitate access to area resources."

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Encourage older residents and adults with disabilities to become members.

Although someone may not need help now, circumstances can change quickly. Family members living outside this area might be happy to have contact with Village staff and volunteers, knowing their loved one is already in the database.

Volunteer. Potential services Village volunteers may assist with include:

- driving to medical/other appointments
- grocery shopping
- friendly check-in calls/visits
- basic yard work
- technology support
- emergency pet care
- organizing/downsizing
- handyman services

Do I need a permit to remove a tree on my property?

Yes, in most cases a permit is required and usually involves replacement. Trees that have been identified as an immediate hazard by the city's enforcement officer do not require a permit in advance. Kamp Washington Small Area Plan



After more than a year of research, analysis, meetings, and revisions to address community input, the Kamp Washington Small Area Plan is almost complete. This plan will make recommendations for the Kamp Washington study area, located around the intersections of Fairfax Boulevard, Lee Highway, and Jermantown Road, providing specific guidance for the desired mix of uses, residential density, building density, design aesthetic, street locations, multimodal connections, infrastructure improvements, parking, and open space.

The small area plan sets five goals for the Kamp Washington study area: cultivating memorable places, designing high quality transitions from the commercial corridor to neighborhoods, improving the multimodal environment, creating quality and sustainable open spaces, and allowing land uses to evolve to meet future needs.

The project consultant team, led by Cunningham Quill Architects, is scheduled to present the final draft of the plan at public hearings with the Planning Commission and City Council on Sept. 12 and Sept. 27, respectively. made a few years ago. The artists used social media to crowdsource specifically colored caps as needed to complete the design, which was painted on the wood panels with acrylic paint. According to the artists, clear water bottle caps, black and silver Coca-Cola caps, and snack pouch caps were the most common donations.

"We hope viewers are pulled into the shapes and textures of the multitude of caps, which make for a fascinating medium," the artists said. "They might be reminded of the myriad of products we use each day, many

of which end up in the landfill unless we make the effort to recycle or reuse, or, especially, to reduce our consumption of these products."

Renew aligns with Persimmon Project's mission to feature native flora and fauna in murals. "The elements of earth, air, fire, and water emerge of the recycling symbol, representing how the community can renew our commitment to protecting the environment by reducing, reusing, and recycling," the artists wrote in an email. Mural viewers may notice familiar black-eved Susan flowers, a northern red oak tree, a swimming brook trout, and butterfly pea plants.

"With all of the earth's elements represented in Renew, we hope that viewers will appreciate the beauty of a healthy ecosystem: clean air and water that support life, bright sunlight, tall trees, and vibrant flowers and vines," said the artists.

The artists spent about 60 hours on the mural. One of the most memorable days during the project was the Art Walk on Main event, where community members helped sort caps by color and the artists began screwing the caps to the painted background.

"We have had the joy of watching children and adults engage with the mural, trying to pick out where the caps came from, and pointing out what they represent," said the artists. "We love that the community is getting inspired by eco art."
