View Local Artwork at New Kathryn Higgins Gallery







airfax City is home to scores of talented local artists, and some are members of the Fairfax Art League, commonly known as FAL. As part of their membership, FAL members are encouraged to display their artwork on the walls of the Kathryn Higgins Art Gallery, located on the lower level of Mosby Tower, just west of Old Town Fairfax at 10560 Main St., in the same building as Patriot's Pub & Grill. Visitors to the gallery will enjoy a wide variety of

painting styles in various media and high-quality photographs created by established and emerging artists.

The gallery, which officially opened May 10, is named in honor of Kathryn Higgins, one of the artists who founded FAL in 1986 and served as executive director until 2000. Higgins was a well-traveled artist who studied painting under several influential teachers. Higgins pursue art throughout her lifetime – and, following her death in 2001, the Kathryn & Wilbert Higgins Endowment Fund continues to support the group she helped found.

"We really feel her spirit today," said Padma Prasad, president of FAL. (Prasad is the daughter of an Indian master painter, and her large mural, Joy, is on display at Bollywood Bistro.)

This is the FAL gallery's third home. FAL spent eight years in Old Town (facing University Drive)

before moving into Old Town Hall, where it stayed until the pandemic lockdown closed the building to the public. FAL opted to find a new space to display members' work and conduct public programs.

The new space in Mosby Tower is a little off the beaten path, but Prasad is excited for FAL to have a home again. "We didn't have a space, and continued on page 3

Personal Property Tax Payments Due Oct. 5

Personal property and vehicle registration fee payments are due by Oct. 5. Late payments will incur a 10% penalty, plus interest.

Payment options:

- Secure drop box outside City Hall (off Armstrong Street)
- Mail checks only (must be postmarked by Oct.5; consider mailing at the post office counter and receive proof of mailing); blue mailing envelope with New York address included with bill
- Online via the Payments button on the city homepage
- In person at Fairfax City Hall

Confirm tax payments online via fairfaxva.gov/mytaxes. To request a copy of your bill, call 703-385-7900 (then press 1). To make changes to your bill, call 703-385-7885. Mason Observatory Evening Under the Stars, Oct. 4, 18

Spend an evening under the stars at Mason's astronomical observatory. Located atop Research Hall on Mason's Fairfax campus, it houses one of the largest diameter telescopes among college campuses in

Drug Take Back Day, October 29

Bring unwanted or expired prescription and over-the-counter drugs to the City of Fairfax Police Department from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Oct. 29. Pills, ointments, and liquids in sealed containers are accepted. (No needles, syringes, or Epi-Pens.) Don't Bag It! Curbside Leaf Collection Begins Oct. 31

From Oct. 31 through Dec. 30, the city will provide curbside leaf collection in neighborhoods that receive city refuse collection service. Please rake leaves loose to the curb. Bagged leaves are not collected during this time. Leaf piles may include light yard debris in leaf piles (grass clippings and weeds) — but not stones, branches, and other large items, which may injure workers and damage equipment. 
Prepare for Inclement Weather: Consider Service Providers, Information Services

now we can meet and hold our programs," she said.

Prasad hopes that some of FAL's upcoming events will draw new people to the gallery. "Paint with FAL Night" is a monthly program open to the public, in which participants are invited to bring their own beverage and learn to paint from FAL members. In addition to the paint nights, FAL members hold receptions to introduce and celebrate new shows. The last reception drew nearly 40 people, and a band from the Commission on the Arts provided entertainment.

Along with visitation, Prasad is trying to grow FAL membership, which is currently at 40 after peaking at three times that when membership was free at the height of the pandemic. "We have such a lovely bunch of volunteers," said Prasad. FAL members are required to pay \$50 and must volunteer 24 hours each year. Membership is open to anyone 18 or older, and high school students are welcome (at a reduced membership cost of \$30). "The Fairfax Art League philosophy is to not say no to anybody," said Prasad. "We welcome every artist who wants to paint and create."

Volunteers run the gallery and lead the monthly Main Street Child Development Art Program at Green Acres Center. "We don't try to overly instruct the children, but we want them to express their creativity," explained Prasad. FAL members provide materials and guidance, often using contemporary artists or an art movement to inspire the children to create a work of art. "We love it," said Prasad, beaming.

The Kathryn Higgins Gallery & Studio is open 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday. All art on display is available for purchase. A new city-supported organization, Fairfax Village in the City, aims to help these individuals continue to age in place. The program seeks volunteers to help support its mission and members.

The goal of the program is to support older residents and adults with disabilities living in Fairfax City who wish to live at home and remain independent. "The Village is not a service provider, but it organizes volunteers to support neighbors in the community," said Lesley Abashian, director of Human Services for the city.

Following a nationwide model, the Village helps to facilitate access to existing services provided by the city and local nonprofits, as well as provide personal services through vetted volunteers. Personal services may include check-in calls and visits, basic yard maintenance and home repairs, technology assistance, and transportation to and from grocery stores and appointments.

"One thing the pandemic highlighted was that the worst thing you can do when you're aging is to age alone or be socially isolated, and the Village will help build these needed relationships," Abashian explained.

Community Connect Expands Services for Residents, Business Owners



Community Connect, the First Due secure public safety database self-managed by city residents and business owners, has expanded its services.

Now, city residents may request residential smoke alarm inspection and replacement services, provided free by the city fire department.

Commercial property users now may identify on-site contacts to be alerted for active public safety-related issues and identify property managers to assist responders with special facility-access needs.

Community Connect is a secure database where you decide what information to include in your profile. Information is secure and accessible only to first responders when called to your property. Info: fairfaxva.gov/ CommunityConnect, 703-385-7878

Plastic Bags Prohibited for Curbside Yard Waste Disposal

A guick reminder: residents who receive refuse collection service from Fairfax City must place vard waste at the curb on collection day in paper bags, reusable containers, or bundles. Yard waste in plastic bags will be marked with a red tag and left at the curb for the residents' attention. Prohibiting the use of plastic bags for vard waste reduces plastic pollution in the city. What's the best way to dispose of food: compost, trash, or garbage disposal?

BEST: Composting. Residents can bring a wide range of food to the city composting center adjacent to City Hall, including veggie scraps, coffee grounds, soiled food — even meat and bones. Please bag all compost dropped off at the **Composting Center; free** bags are available at the center. Residents can pick up a free compost caddy in the City Hall Atrium. Or consider launching your own backyard composting program for rich, nutrient, natural mulch. Info: fairfaxva.gov/composting

GOOD: Trash. If you can't compost, put your food in the trash. Bag your food waste to protect against odor and animals.

BAD: Garbage disposal. This choice involves excessive water use, fatty and greasy items washing down the drain, and introducing food solids into your plumbing and into the wastewater system. The more food you can keep out of the pipes, the better. Info: composting@fairfaxva.gov

Millions of pumpkins thrown in the trash every November! Keep this frightful activity at bay by dropping off your pumpkins, jack-o-lanterns, gourds, painted pumpkins, and other decomposable food décor at the City of Fairfax Composting Center at Fairfax City Hall. Be creative: pumpkins can be composted in backyard composters, or even buried in the backyard. However, please do not dispose of any pumpkins or food in the woods. Info: fairfaxva.gov/composting




Community Cleanup, Nov. 6


