Don't Bag It! Curbside Leaf Collection Provided Through Dec. 30

Residents who receive curbside refuse collection service from the city may rake their leaves loose to the curb for collection. Please rake loose leaves to the curb no later than Dec. 23 for collection. Bagged leaves are not collected until January 2023. Leaves are collected by neighborhood about once every two weeks (often more frequently). Heavy leaf fall or inclement weather may affect leaf collection schedules. TAP Offers Interest-Free Loans Available for Tax Payments

The Taxpayer Assistance Program (TAP) offers interest-free loans to pay real estate taxes. Borrow \$250 - \$15,000, and repay monthly for six to 10 months. Apply in-person with the Treasurer's Office. There is a 7.5% fee. Info: fairfaxva.gov (search "TAP"), 703-385-7900

Public Works Crew Pull All-Nighter to Prevent Traffic Delay





Shortly after 2 a.m. on Sept. 25, the city's Sign and Signal crew was ready to go home. Bobby Keller, Traian Olteanu, Tom Terry, Joe Cotellessa, and Lucian Stoica had spent eight hours replacing a signal cabinet, and they knew they were due to report for work again in the morning. They wanted to answer the call of their beds, but instead they received a call from the police dispatcher, telling them a traffic signal pole had been knocked down at the intersection of Main Street and Whitacre Road.

The crew arrived on the scene to find the pole lying in the road surrounded by debris. A pickup truck had hit the pole, knocking it down, and a second vehicle had driven into the debris. The scene was a mess. The crew knew repairing the pole would be challenging, and they knew the work had to be completed before the Monday morning rush hour. The clock was ticking.

Stoica, the Sign and Signal supervisor, closed the lanes and placed signs to create a safe working environment for the crew. Installing a temporary wooden pole requires digging. "I called Miss Utility on an emergency ticket, and they showed up and marked all utilities within four hours," said Stoica.

With the utilities identified, the crew was able to remove cables and clean up the debris from the shattered signal. The intersection was a hive of activity, with two signal bucket trucks, a frontend loader, a dump truck with trailer, and a utility pole truck. Sign and Signal Superintendent Johnnie Greer said it takes a high level of skill to work around high voltage. "To take on the task as if it's something we rehearse daily is just unbelievable," he said.

The crew's work to clean up and prepare the area made it much safer for the Relee Construction team to drill

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Fairfax City to Conduct Stream Condition Assessments in New Year

Fairfax City Stormwater Management Division staff will assess the main stem of Accotink Creek and all of its tributaries starting in December. Residents may observe staff wearing fluorescent safety vests as they document and rate conditions in the stream corridors. The stream condition assessment is expected to conclude in April 2023.

The city's current water quality and quantity improvement plans are based on a 2008 stream assessment. The new data gathered by the team will be evaluated to determine which stream segments require attention. Staff will record and rate factors such as streambank and streambed erosion and conditions in the floodplain, RPA, and at outfalls (where stormwater runoff enters creeks).

Accotink Creek originates in Fairfax City and flows south toward the Potomac River. The city is responsible for the quality of the water within its borders. Stream restoration and other projects implemented in the upper reaches of Accotink Creek have a positive impact on water quality downstream. In addition to existing conditions, the team will assess the performance of previously restored stream segments.

BE WINTER SALT SMART

Applying winter salt to roads and sidewalks after a storm allows businesses, government, and social services to stay open with little interruption. But did you know a teaspoon of salt can permanently pollute five gallons of water?

Since there's no easy or cheap way to remove salt from our environment, we all can do our part to reduce the amount of salt we use. Protecting our drinking water sources (the Potomac River and the Occoguan Reservoir) depends on all of us being winter salt smart.

If you choose to apply salt, follow the directions, and apply it sparingly. Excess salt raises sodium levels in our drinking water and increases treatment costs; harms fish, plants, and other wildlife; and corrodes vehicles, roads, bridges, and parking lots, making our community more expensive to maintain.

WHAT TO DO DURING AND AFTER A STORM

- Shovel snow early and often
- Try traction materials, such as sand, native-blend bird seed, and zeolite crystals
- Apply salt after clearing snow and only where needed
- Be patient and give the salt time to work the colder it is, the longer it will take for the salt to melt what snow or ice remains after shoveling
 - Let the sun do some of the work before you apply salt
 - Securely store salt and traction materials
 - Sweep up extra salt or traction material to reuse
 - Remember: nitrogen and phosphorus salts are illegal in Virginia



hours of work, the temporary pole and signals were operating by 3 p.m. Sunday. The crew's all-nighter had paid off.

"When individuals can rally together in such a short time and do this amount of work, it is just unheard of," said Greer. "I'm retiring in a few months, but it feels good to know that when I took this job, I was asked to try and help others prepare to take on the leadership role. And if you would have seen what I had a chance to witness, I can say without a doubt the City of Fairfax has the best traffic system team I have ever been a part of in 32 years."

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City Seal Retirement Ceremony

The city seal, adopted in 1973, will be retired during a short ceremony at 6 p.m. on Dec. 6 in the City Hall Council Chamber. The city seal was redesigned as part of the Connecting Fairfax City for All initiative, with creative direction by city residents through a public survey on Engage Fairfax.

The City of Fairfax Fire Department and Police Department badges and patches will be retired during the ceremony - as both departments' badges and shoulder patches include elements of the former city seal and new badges and patches will be pinned on public safety team members' uniforms.

The Police Department has proudly served our community while wearing its badge and patch since 1980, shortly after the former city seal was adopted. For 20 years, the fire department has protected lives and property while wearing its badge and patch, which features elements of the former city seal. Staff from both departments were instrumental in designing the new badges and patches.

The ceremony will be televised on Channel 12 and livestreamed on the city website.
