Membership



City of Fairfax Community Response Team

The Community Response Team (CRT) is a specialized, multidisciplinary team created to provide real-time behavioral health crisis response along with targeted outreach, post-crisis follow-up and short-term case coordination. CRT's targeted outreach efforts will include advocating for Village services and making referrals to City residents who can benefit by becoming a member of the Village.


