REFLECTIONS ON 2023

A Message from Mayor Catherine Read

As we celebrate the arrival of the New Year, I want to take a moment to reflect on a few highlights from 2023. Our City Council and staff, in partnership with city boards and commissions, neighborhood leaders, nonprofits, regional partners, and the local business community are working together to keep our city safe, vibrant, and forward-focused. Exciting things are happening here!

- Public restrooms are now available at Van Dyck Park, Draper Drive Park, Old Town Square, and near Fairfax Circle. Permanent restrooms are being considered for Thaiss Memorial and Kutner parks.
- The Homelessness Task Force was created in 2023 to address the pressing concerns in our community that impact those who are unhoused, city residents, and local businesses.
- We established the Community Response Team, a multidisciplinary team consisting of a licensed clinician, a community paramedic, and a CIT-trained police officer. The team provides real-time behavioral health crisis response along with targeted outreach, post-crisis follow-up, and short-term case coordination.
- Three new events celebrated Fairfax City's diversity and commit-



- ment to inclusivity: Fairfax Pride, Fairfax Fiesta, and Juneteenth. Additionally, the Asian Festival on Main continues to grow each year.
- Our CUE buses have a new distinctive look, and ridership has increased due to the fare-free pilot program. Outdoor seating and lighting have been installed at some locations, as well as digital real-time arrival signs at several bus stops. We continue to invest in public transit.
- Ten Capital Bikeshare stations are now available for anyone who wants to incorporate short bike trips into their commute or for running errands. Unlocking a bike is easy, affordable, and fun!

- A new crosswalk was installed to make walking between the library and the Main Street Marketplace easier and safer.
- We held 30 ribbon-cutting ceremonies for new restaurants, educational companies, and businesses in the health, beauty, fitness, and lifestyle industries. Fairfax City continues to boast the lowest commercial and retail vacancies in the region.
- Redevelopment of aging commercial areas continued with construction at the former Breezeway Motel site, Boulevard VI, Sutton Heights, The Moxley, Safford Brown Mazda, and North-fax West. Small area planning for Fairfax Circle is underway.
- Fairfax City became a V3-Certified Employer. The Virginia Values Veterans (V3) Program

Stay Green This Winter: Recycle Holiday Greenery, Lights



Turn your live trees, garlands, and wreaths into mulch. Fairfax City refuse customers may place live holiday greenery at the curb on their collection day. Remember to remove ornaments, tinsel, wires, and other decorations.

Additionally, keep your string lights out of the trash by recycling them! Drop them off at Fairfax Ace Hardware (10310-B Main St.) and Fairfax City Hall during regular operating hours through Valentine's Day. Let's beat last year's record of nearly two tons of lights!

Composting: Turn Food Waste into Soil Nutrients

Composting is the most efficient and earth-friendly way to rid your household of rotten food, leftovers, and food scraps. The City of Fairfax Composting Center (open 24/7 adjacent to City Hall) accepts nearly all food, thanks to a special process that breaks down bones, oils, and other foods not typically recommended for backyard composting. Please remember to use compostable bags for your food waste, which are available at the center. Info: fairfaxva.gov/composting

Be Salt Smart this Winter

As the temperatures drop, be mindful of slippery roadways and walkways and the overuse of de-icing salt. When overused, de-icing salt can contaminate waterways and impact wildlife. Be salt smart this winter season and follow these tips to protect yourself and the environment:

- **Shovel snow early and often** and allow the sun to do much of the melting before applying salt. If you need to add de-icing salt for safety, apply it only after clearing away any snow and only where needed. Never place de-icing salt on snow.
- **Use no more than a 12-ounce coffee mug worth of salt** for about a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Using salt doesn't melt ice faster.
- **Be patient and give the salt time to work.** The colder it is, the longer it will take for the salt to melt what snow or ice remains after shoveling.
- **Consider trying natural traction alternatives to de-icing salts,** such as sand, native-blend bird seed, or zeolite crystals.
- **Securely store de-icing salt and traction materials** in a cool, dry place. Remember to sweep up and reuse extra salt or traction materials.

The city's snow removal crews are doing their part to reduce salt usage without compromising safety. Pre-treating roadways with brine when appropriate, monitoring air and pavement temperatures, and monitoring road conditions and forecasts to decide how to respond to a winter storm are just some of the techniques used to make roads safer for travel without excessive salt application. *Info: fairfaxva.gov (search 'salt')*

DEVELOPMENT REVIEW OMBUDSMAN



The ombudsman position was created to help residents, business owners, and developers obtain City of Fairfax building, site plan, zoning, business, and other development permits or licenses.

I have two main roles in my new position. Internally, I work with staff in various departments to help streamline and improve the development review process, identify what is and is not working, and facilitate fixing any issues. Externally, I simply help anyone who needs assistance with the development process. I'm the person you reach out to if you have questions about how to get something built on your property, how to get a new sign approved for your business, or how to navigate the city's online application portal.

We are placing more applications online through our City of Fairfax Permit Portal. This streamlines the various review processes and helps enhance review consistency and customer transparency. Customers with difficulty digitizing things or

navigating the portal can always reach out with any questions or concerns. We are here to help!

My roots and my family are here in Fairfax City. I grew up in Mosby Woods and attended Westmore Elementary School (now a dog park that I brought to City Council for a special use permit), then Providence Elementary, Katherine Johnson Middle School, and Fairfax High School.

I started with the city in 2012 as a college intern with the Community Development and Planning Department. I helped with a parking study in Old Town that summer, including looking at a parking lot that is now Old Town Square. In January 2016, after grad school, I started full-time with the city as a planner in CDP, where for about five years I served as staff liaison to the Board of Architectural Review and reviewed land use applications brought to City Council.

In late 2020, I relocated to New York City. For the first year, I worked at a permit expediting firm, assisting developers, property owners, architects, and engineers through the Department of Buildings permitting approval process. After that, I began as a planner in Montclair Township in New Jersey, where I worked for 18 months as the staff liaison for the Historic Preservation Commission and Zoning Board of Adjustment. I moved back to Northern Virginia this past July and worked briefly at a land use and zoning law firm before being hired as the city's new development review ombudsman.



City Hosts Regional Electric Vehicle Fleet Technician Workshop



Across the region, municipalities are transitioning to cleaner and more sustainable means of transportation, and electric vehicles are quickly replacing traditional vehicles in our fleet. The demand for skilled and certified EV technicians is rising, and the city answered this call by hosting a regional training for EV technicians.

More than 23 fleet technicians from four municipalities, including Town of Leesburg, City of Alexandria, City of Manassas, and City of Fairfax, gathered at the city's fleet garage on Oct. 23 to be trained and certified in safety and level-one technician requirements. The training ensures fleet technicians working on EVs meet OSHA requirements.

Spearheaded by Fleet Superintendent Lee Hall, this working group of fleet technicians will help all the jurisdictions transition their fleet vehicles to EVs. The transportation sector makes up 28% of all greenhouse gas emissions entering the atmosphere. As our city fleet vehicles are replaced with electric or plug-in hybrids, and trained technicians are needed. The city plans to host a second event that covers requirements for ASE level 2 certification.



Volunteer's Crocheted Hats and Scarves Provide Warmth



In 2019, the city's cultural arts manager, Megan Dubois, launched a program called *A Warm Gesture* to provide hats and scarves to people experiencing homelessness or having trouble heating their homes.

Each year, local makers are called upon to knit and crochet hats, scarves, and gloves for distribution in the D.C. metro area. Frank Taylor (pictured right), a city resident, has been active with the project since its inception. Every season he contributes a prolific number of handcrafted items that are marveled at by those

who receive them. In early December, two large bags of hats and scarves he crocheted were delivered to The Lamb Center.

"Every time I see homeless people, I feel terrible that there are people living on the streets and we're not doing anything about it," said Taylor. "So this is my small way of doing something about it."

"Frank is an artisan," said Debra Wright, City of Fairfax Arts Commissioner (pictured left). "His work is impeccably crafted and would retail at a high price if he chose to sell it, but he instead shares selflessly with others. The benefits go far beyond merely keeping someone warm. Frank's creations make others feel

BEHIND THE BADGE Crime Trends and Public Safety Meeting



On Nov. 16, 2023, the Fairfax City Police Department held a community meeting on crime trends and public safety. At the meeting held at the Sherwood Center, police officers addressed issues and observations by the public, as well as trends observed by the police.

Chief Erin Schaible said the department is embracing technology and offering a plethora of programs for the public, including tools residents and business owners can use to keep themselves safe.

"We want to make sure they know their police department is engaged and problem-solving in their community," Chief Schaible said. "We are listening to their needs, and they can be assured we're taking appropriate action."



Police presented Fairfax City crime statistics, and attendees broke into small groups to discuss concerns with police officers. The presentation is available online at fairfaxva.gov/police. The police advised residents to call 911 immediately if they feel threatened.

Taylor’s sister taught him basic crochet stitches. He practiced them and watched YouTube videos before starting his first scarf. It didn’t turn out well, according to him. Taylor kept at it, though, focusing on scarves for a year before moving on to hats.

Taylor considers summer his production time. He enjoys crocheting on the couch, especially in the morning. “It’s a good way to relax and unwind,” he said.

Wright said the program provides 300-400 hats and scarves each year, and Taylor’s work accounts for much of it. “I’ve had people come up and say, ‘Wow! This is the most beautiful thing I’ve ever owned.’ And that’s a bright spot in their day,” said Wright. “You can’t put a price tag on that, and I think that’s why we keep doing what we’re doing.”

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increases employment opportunities and promotes economic development by training and certifying organizations in veterans workforce best practices. Fairfax City now proudly displays its V3 Certified Seal, indicating its desire to grow and improve the organization by tapping into an extremely valuable talent pool of veterans and military spouses.

- More than 50 volunteers removed nonnative invasive plants from Kutner Park in February.
- More than 250 volunteers removed 2,000+ pounds of litter from our parks, trails, and streams in March.
- We hosted workshops on how to build worm composters and rain barrels.

- We purchased three electric vehicles to begin transitioning to a zero-emission fleet, and city staff continue to test battery-powered landscaping equipment.
- We adopted a formal Title VI plan. By enforcing Title VI, we ensure individuals from diverse backgrounds have equal access to educational, healthcare, and other services supported by federal funds. The plan plays a vital role in fostering inclusivity, breaking down barriers, and promoting a society where everyone has a fair chance to thrive.
- Fairfax Village in the City, a support network for older adults who want to age in place, has grown to 78 members and 40 volunteers.

Fairfax City is distinguished by our geography as the epicenter of Northern Virginia. We are a

small gem of a community where people value the feeling of being connected and belonging. Our proximity to Virginia’s most diverse university provides opportunities for us as a city, and our free CUE Bus service offers an important connection for the students at George Mason University and for our residents. What our city offers in abundance is opportunities.

As we celebrate the holidays and welcome the New Year, take a moment to reflect on how fortunate we are to call Fairfax City our home. We will face challenges in 2024 for which there may not be clear or easy answers. It’s my hope that we all show up for each other in good faith to work toward the best solutions possible.

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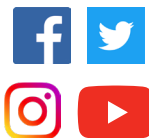

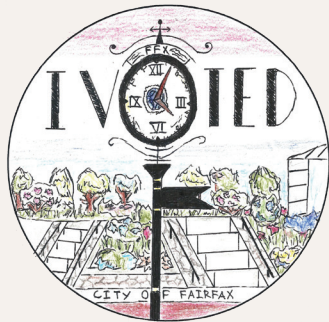
