

Stafford Drive Stream Restoration Slated to Begin This Fall

project to restore nearly half a mile of Stafford Drive stream between Fair Woods Parkway and Cardinal Road Park is expected to start by November. Stream restoration projects repair years of unintentional abuse, restore ecological functions in the stream valley, and improve recreational experiences for residents. The stream restoration project also will provide credit toward meeting the city's state and federal regulatory requirements that protect water quality in the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

The city's Municipal Separate
Storm Sewer Permit requires the
city to reduce the discharge of
pollutants into state-owned surface
waters. Stream characteristics
change naturally over time, but
streams in urbanized areas must
be managed to protect public
and private property and critical
infrastructure, such as underground
sanitary sewer lines.

The Stafford Drive stream was identified as a high priority for restoration in the 2007 Accotink Creek Stream Stability Assessment.



COUNCIL ACTIONS OF MAY 7, 2024

PUBLIC HEARING

New Chain Bridge Road Sidewalk Installed

The city constructed the missing segment of sidewalk on the east side of northbound Chain Bridge Road, from the existing sidewalk north of Kenmore Drive to Cedar Avenue. Additionally, the pedestrian crossing at Cedar Avenue was relocated to the north side of the intersection.

Stafford Drive Stream

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The \$2.3M project was approved in the FY 2021 budget and included in the FY 2022-26 Capital Improvement Program.

The city's plan review process approved the design, and the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality approved the project for a Stormwater Local Assistance Fund grant totaling \$1.175M. The project team is preparing contract documents and awaits final permitting determinations from the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers.

The city will use natural channel design techniques to stabilize the stream, prevent further erosion, and reconnect the stream to the floodplain. Natural materials incorporated in the design will slow down rushing stormwater and restore the natural meander found in stable streams.

As with any construction project, there will be temporary disruption, which can cause discomfort: trees must be removed to allow the city to grade the stream banks and create construction access, and heavy equipment will be audible in the project area. The city will install native plantings toward the end of the proiect, which will need time to take root and flourish. However, some benefits of stream restoration will be realized immediately - stable conditions and improved water quality - while others require patience. In three to five years, nature will have hidden most signs of a construction project. Restoring the stream now is an investment in the city's future and helps the city meet its water quality obligations.






Adopted Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Highlights

City Council adopted the budget for fiscal year 2025 in May, and the budget year begins July 1. Estimated expenditures for all funds totaling \$264,306,594 cover everything from the agreement with Fairfax County Public Schools to new facilities, planned maintenance, public safety, and everything else needed to run the city and provide services to residents and businesses. The two pie charts illustrate the city's revenue sources and how the money will be spent.

Noteworthy projects in the FY 2025 budget include renovating the Fairfax High School auditorium, installing security cameras at both elementary schools, maintaining the property yard, replacing Fire Station 3, continuing to rehabilitate Old Town Hall, renovating Thaiss Memorial Park, installing wayfinding signage in parks and on trails, replacing the Pat Rodio Park playground equipment, installing new school marquees, creating a Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Plan, planning to transition to electric landscaping equipment, purchasing lidded recycling carts for households, repairing the splash pad at Old Town Square, resurfacing tennis courts, and maintaining stormwater and wastewater infrastructure, streets, sidewalks, the cemetery, streetlights, HVAC systems, and much more.


