

Introduction

Phase I of the strategic planning process focused on engaging the entire community in a variety of interactive public participation processes to identify what the citizens and City Council felt were priorities for the future of parks, recreation, trails, open space, events and cultural arts. The extensive community outreach effort included a series of four public workshops in varying formats, twenty two stakeholder meetings, a statistically valid random survey of 668 City households, a web based survey, on-line civic engagement through the Our Parks, Our Future website, and a follow-up public workshop to summarize and review findings. Phase I activities resulted in the development of vision statement, mission statement, operating philosophy, goals and objectives.

The City was committed to implementing a robust, innovative and extensive effort to engage the entire community in developing the Strategic Master Plan. In advance of each outreach activity, the Parks and Recreation Department promoted the event through a broad range of media including brochures, flyers, web announcements, video clips, mailers to City residents, signs, placards, and announcements distributed through partners. The unprecedented outreach program generated tremendous participation and input. More than 500 individuals participated in public workshops and stakeholder events. More than 2,300 visitors participated in the online Our Parks, Our Future web site. The statistically valid household survey generated a 23 percent response rate, with 668 households responding. Additionally, numerous emails, letters, and other forms of correspondence were factored into the community input effort. City residents vocalized a tremendous sense of pride in the City and its parks, programs and services. There was a demonstrated sense of value, appreciation, and satisfaction in the current programs and services delivered in the City, however there was also a strong desire to enhance, improve and expand current programs, parks, and services. The outreach initiative generated a long and diverse "wish list" for the future of parks, recreation, trails, open space, events and cultural arts. The following section provides a summary of each component of the public engagement effort.



Public Engagement

Stakeholder Group Interviews

More than 20 stakeholder/partner groups were actively engaged throughout the planning process. Initially all 22 groups participated in individualized meetings with the planning consultants to provide input on their unique characteristics, needs, trends and ideas for the future of the parks and recreation program. As the Action Plan was developed in Phase II, PRAB members and staff met with key stakeholder groups to ensure the Plan aligned with the stakeholder groups' goals and objectives. The ongoing engagement and participation in the planning effort was essential to the success and future implementation of the Plan.

Stakeholder groups included trail users, teens, families, seniors, special needs individuals, ethnic communities, environmental groups, civic associations, HOAs, community associations, athletic leagues, Commission on the Arts, Historic Fairfax City Inc., George Mason University, Fairfax County Park Authority, members of the business community, Interservice Club, City of Fairfax School Board members and School staff, City Council, PRAB and staff.

Included in this section are short summaries of the input received from the various stakeholder group meetings held during Phase I of the planning process. More detailed summaries are on file at the Parks and Recreation Department.

Summary of Input – Trail Users

The City of Fairfax established a Parks and Recreation Trails Committee to study and bring forward a recommended plan for trails in the City of Fairfax. The Committee established a plan for future development of trails in the City and prioritized individual projects for future development. Members of the Trails Committee were invited to participate in a stakeholder meeting. Input received is summarized below.

Summary of Input - Partners - GMU, FCPA, NVRPA

The City of Fairfax has formal cooperative agreements with the Fairfax County Park Authority and Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority that allows City residents to use county and regional park facilities at the same rates as county residents. The partnership with these two organizations is critical to ensuring City residents have access to a variety of park and recreation resources. Similarly, the City collaborates with George Mason University on an ongoing basis for a variety of mutually beneficial services and activities. Members of these three organizations were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

Summary of Input – City Staff

The Parks and Recreation Department works closely with numerous City of Fairfax departments including Community Development and Planning and Public Works. Staff members from these departments were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Trails System Critical for Connectivity for transportation and recreation purposes, tie all recreation facilities, open space, neighborhoods and business together
- Parks and Recreation Link to Economic Development primary redevelopment will be Kamp Washington, North Fairfax Boulevard and Fairfax Circle
- Opportunities abound to factor in recreation
- Challenges exist in meeting increased and varying demands
- Fairfax Small Town Feel maintain the small town feel, create our own brand and recognition, what is it? Link to downtown economics

Summary of Input - City of Fairfax Schools Principals and Staff

The Parks and Recreation Department collaborates with the City school staff on use of the facilities and grounds for park and recreation activities. Principals and activities staff from the City schools were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.



- Parks and Recreation Use of School Facilities athletic fields, field houses, gyms, class rooms, auditorium, parking lots
- Parks and Recreation Comes First for Scheduling after school needs, timeline is tight
- Parks and Recreation Programming at Schools fields for athletic games, camps, theater groups. City Band concerts, summer camps, basketball in the gym.
- Parks and Recreation and School Relationship facilities owned by the City, instruction program staffed by County school systems, County maintains facilities, City gives funding for extras
- Parks and Recreation Staff are Competent, Professional, Well Managed compared to County, the City staff and programs are first rate
- Other Needs pool, field improvement and conversion to synthetic turf, more camps, skate park near middle school, parking

Summary of Input – Teens

City of Fairfax teens (ages 12 to 18 years) involved with the Rotary Interact group join together to address issues in the community they care most about. Teens from this group were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Current and Prior Use of Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs athletic and sports leagues, Van Dyck Park, summer camps, July 4th Parade, special events
- What do you like most? Van Dyck Park, variety of programs and classes, Movies Under the Moon, Fall Festival, Chocolate Lovers, First Night Out
- What's Missing? not much for our age group, Movies Under the Moon, trips (theme parks), advanced rec program, laser tag, cooking, semi organized summer activities (bon
- More Ideas for the Future— upgrade the downtown area (it just didn't materialize), movie theater, retail shops, ways to connect with friends, dog park, more running trails, more trees and flowers, NO MORE LED LIGHTS or blow up things for Christmas Festival of Lights

Summary of Input – Special Events and Business Community

The City of Fairfax hosts a wide variety of special events that attract thousands of attendees throughout the year. The Independence Day Parade attracts 60,000 participants. Many of the events are coordinated by staff, committees, and the business community. Members from these organizations were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Current Trends? retail is down, sponsorships are down, population has shifted, hard to get participation although numbers at the events are staying steady
- What could be improved? diversify events, add International Festival, involve GMU, leverage students at GMU, encourage ability to walk downtown, provide opportunities for adults to participate without kids, add a Taste of Fairfax, increase retail, create identity for the Downtown
- Other Suggestions Antique Car Show, antique fair, get schools involved in Festival of Lights and Spotlight on the Arts, develop more partnerships with businesses like Patriot Harley and Fair City Mall, close off the downtown for events, Movies Under the Moon or roof top of garage

Summary of Input – Environmental Sustainability Committee

The Environmental Sustainability Committee is committed to guiding the City of Fairfax to become an environmentally sustainable "green city." Members of the Committee were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.



- Stream Erosion #1 Problem— development and paving in the City over the years increased speed and quantity of storm water and erosion. New requirements will apply to the City
- Parks and Recreation Focus on Sustainability; Economics passive and lower impact use of open space are more economical than artificial turf fields, lighting, sound systems, etc.
- Goals for the Future
 - green building
 - storm water
 - energy efficiency (home energy efficiency)
 - City recycling program

Summary of Input - Home Owner Associations, Civic Associations, Community **Associations**

The City of Fairfax has numerous home owner associations, civic associations, and community associations. Members of these organizations were invited to participate in two stakeholder sessions and the results of the discussions are summarized below.

- What do you like about the parks in the area? convenience, short walk, sense of community, social gathering place, trails, community use for picnics and socials
- What could be improved? regular maintenance and replacement of equipment and trails, age appropriate equipment, places to sit, shading, electricity for pavilions, handball courts, multi-use courts
- What is your vision for the future?
 - Amphitheater for movies and concerts
 - Community gardens.
 - Dog park
 - Safer better trails
 - Wi-Fi in the parks
 - Public art
 - Branding for the City
 - More pedestrian friendly City

Summary of Input – Interservice Club Council

The Interservice Club Council coordinates the good works of the numerous service clubs in the City. Members were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Current and Prior Use of Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs participate in special events, use of Stacy C. Sherwood Center for events, Old Town Hall for events
- What do you like most?-Van Dyck Park appeals to all generations, Stacy C. Sherwood Center, acquisition of open space, good rapport with Parks and Recreation Department, impressed with offerings
- What Could be Improved more kids activities in the summer and holidays, more daycare and funding for kids who cannot afford camps, parking in the City, restrooms in the parks
- Ideas for the Future-
 - Complete Kitty Poser Garden Park
 - Preserve open space
 - Better transportation options and less traffic
 - More accessible services for seniors; improve or replace Green Acres



Notes on Services for Ethnic Groups - 90% of school children who use library are of Korean descent; not a large collection of library resources in Spanish, some Muslim programs started by GMU, increase in Indians in the community, library has diverse staff which helps in communication

Summary of Input – Athletic Leagues

The City of Fairfax has a very active athletic league community and consists of the Fairfax Police Youth Club, Fairfax Little League, Vienna Stars Softball, Elite Lacrosse, Fairfax Youth Inc., Adult Soccer and the athletic programs at Fairfax High School and Paul VI High School. Members from these organizations were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Athletic Leagues Represent Broad Community Interest- children, youth, adults; field hockey, football, softball, lacrosse, soccer, basketball, wrestling, track, cheer, volley ball, rugby, t-ball, baseball
- Almost 10,000 Participants on an Annual Basis numbers constantly increasing. demand exceeds ability to meet needs given limits on field/court space
- **Approximately 40-50% are City Residents –** varies by sport and age group.
- Challenges limited field space for play and practice, lighting expands opportunity for play, synthetic turf reduces maintenance, overscheduling limits opportunity for "walk on" play
- Wish List more lights with extended hours, more synthetic turf, improve Lanier, maximize existing land, plan for replacement of synthetic turf fields, expand indoor space access

Summary of Input – Seniors

The City of Fairfax has a very active senior population and the hub of senior activity is at the Green Acres Community Center. Members from the Senior Center Council and Senior Center members were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below. This was the largest group of stakeholders.

- Current and Prior Use of Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs- Green Acres Center activities and facilities, pickle ball, dancing, trips, classes, trails, fitness, exercise
- What do you like most?— Darlene's fitness classes, gym, trips, dancing, bingo, bunko, Mahjung, social center and gathering place, library...
- What Could be Improved? Green Acres facility in need of renovation/repair, bathrooms, storage, exercise equipment, accessibility, indoor water...
- Build a New Senior Center or Significantly Improve Existing Building bathrooms, therapy pool, working kitchen, gym with wooden floor, indoor pool, wellness center, accessible to the CUE, parking, qualified and dedicated staff, state of the art exercise equipment, computers, lunch and meal service

Summary of Input – Faith Based Groups

Representatives from several places of worship in the City of Fairfax were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Current and Prior Use of Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs Stacy C. Sherwood Center, Old Town Hall, Van Dyck Park
- What do you like most? Fall Festival, Stacy C. Sherwood Center, Van Dyck Park, special events, staff and cooperation with City on use of facilities
- What's Missing? more satellite parking for events, transportation/access, programs for older adults, lower pricing at Sherwood
- More Ideas for the Future-

- Retreat locations
- More youth activities
- Dog park

Summary of Input – Families

Invitations to participate in a stakeholder meeting emphasizing families with young children were made to parents of children participating in the City's park and recreation programs. Several parents attended; results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Current and Prior Use of Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs Van Dyck Park, Ratcliffe Park, Oak Marr, Providence Park, athletic leagues, local pools, local parks, camps, etc.
- What do you like most?- playgrounds, camps, trail connectivity, small parks with less people, special events, Sherwood Center, Leisure Times magazine
- What's Missing? indoor pool!!!! It is hard to get into County swim classes; birthday party options; nature center; spray ground, bathrooms, more information
- More Ideas for the Future-
 - INDOOR POOL!!!
 - Mother Son Camp Out
 - Learn to Fish and rural skills training
 - More and better trails
 - Better parking and access to Thaiss Memorial Park
 - Community gathering place in down town area
 - Indoor park/playground

Summary of Input - Special Needs Groups

To ensure input was received from residents with developmental, physical and other special needs and services, the City sought to engage a variety of perspectives. Attendees in this stakeholder group were predominantly focused on infants, toddlers, and children with developmental disabilities. Results of the discussion are summarized below.

- "Special Needs" are Very Broad varies by age (infant, toddler, child, youth, young adult, seniors); ability and disability. Stakeholders interviewed primarily represented young children on the autism spectrum
- Fairfax Area Offers Tremendous Resources many resources are available through the County, City, non-profits, etc. Sometimes tough to navigate
- Barriers for Participation transportation, cost, trained instructors, language (for non-English speakers), timing of programs and open hours, weather
- Ideas for the Future -
 - All access playgrounds
 - Play areas with natural barriers to keep kids in
 - Water features like Special Harbor Spray Park at Lee District
 - Connected, paved walking trails (strollers and wheel chairs)



- Indoor play spaces
- Help to navigate all the available resources

Summary of Input - Historic Fairfax City, Inc.

Blenheim Historic Site is owned by the City of Fairfax and managed by the City's historic resources staff. The facility is used for community rentals, which is coordinated by the Parks and Recreation Department. Members of Historic Fairfax City, Inc. were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Source of Pride for Community City invested in historic facilities, tremendous facility, attractive grounds, natural as well cultural value
- Need to Raise Awareness of Site desire to promote and raise awareness of the site for visitation and sustainability; capital campaign for stabilizing house
- Emphasis on Preservation and Interpretation recreation tends to focus on revenue, HFCI emphasizes preservation and interpretation
- Blenheim's Original Design Focused on Interpretive Site; Not a Rental Facility lacks adequate parking and outdoor lighting, insufficient indoor kitchen and storage, impact on grounds
- Ideas for the Future -
 - More interaction with City to promote the site
 - Stabilize Blenheim house
 - Secure large donors
 - Certify the museum
 - Place historical markers along Daniel's Run
 - Add storage facility to manage collections
 - Add parking
 - Save John Seewood House
 - City should develop a more vibrant downtown area
 - City needs branding

Summary of Input – Ethnic Communities

The City's population has diversified in ethnic makeup significantly over the past 40 years. The non-Caucasian population in 1970 represented only 2 percent of the City's population. Today, 39 percent of the City's residents are non-Caucasian. Members of the various ethnic groups in the City were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- Fairfax Area has Become Very Diverse significant representation of Hispanic, Korean, Chinese, Vietnamese, Filipino and Indian populations
- Strong Desire to Hold on to and Cultivate Unique Cultural Heritage individual communities develop and offer programs and services within their communities, families place strong emphasis on educating children about their culture (e.g. classical Chinese dance)
- Different Cultures Have Different Leisure Patterns and Interests more research is needed to define these interests and needs
- Ideas for the Future -
 - City has facilities, cultural groups have need for space to hold their programs ...join the two
 - Expand international events and advertise to the whole community



Consider liaison function in the City to connect more directly with various cultural groups

Summary of Input – Arts Organizations

The City of Fairfax has a thriving and robust cultural arts program that involves numerous arts groups. Their collective efforts contribute significantly to the City's sense of place and small town atmosphere. Members of the Commission on the Arts, Spotlight on the Arts, Fall for the Book, City Band, George Mason University, and other arts organizations were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

- What is the City doing well in the Arts? performing arts series, children's series, City Band, Fall Festival, November Arts and Crafts Festival, July 4th Parade, Spotlight on the Arts, GMU Center for the Arts, GMU Senior Festival, classes at Sherwood
- How ould the Arts be improved in the City? public art, theater downtown, permanent art gallery, collaborate more with GMU, increase literary arts, fulltime Arts Director
- What is your vision for the future of Arts in the City by the year 2023?
 - The area's greatest collection of public art
 - 300 600 seat theater
 - More permanent art venues downtown
 - Stable source of funding for the arts
 - Dedicated staff
 - More studio space with condos in city
 - GMU and City collaboration

Summary of Input – City of Fairfax School Board

The City of Fairfax School Board is a critical partner to the Parks and Recreation Department, as the school facilities and grounds are used for recreational programming and activities. Members of the School Board were invited to participate in a stakeholder interview and the results of the discussion are summarized below.

Priorities for Parks and Recreation?

- Athletic fields analyze needs first, consider more turf fields, consider use of field by City vs. non City residents
- Connectivity of Trails improve access, reduce traffic, enhance safety
- Partner Relationships assess and maximize relationships with Fairfax County, GMU,

Future of Westmore and Green Acres?

Public Workshops Summaries

A total of six public workshops were conducted throughout the planning process. The workshops were designed to engage current and potential residents and program, facility, event and activity participants in interactive and fun sessions to create the "vision" for the future of the City's parks, recreation, trails, open space, events and cultural arts. More specifically, the workshops were designed to encourage and enable participation by all; solicit input on current use, perception, and vision for the future; and create excitement and buy-in for the community-wide visioning process. To enhance active participation by all residents, the City sponsored children's activities and provided multi-lingual and sign language translators.

During May 2013, two interactive sessions were held at Providence Elementary School and in Old Town Fairfax. Both workshops provided a combination of briefings, information booths, opportunities for participants to provide comments on top priority needs, "vote with money" on the priorities they believed were highest priority for the City, children's activities, entertainment, and opportunities to interact with Staff, PRAB and members of Council.







Following the May public workshops, several key themes began to surface in the public input effort. Two additional public workshops were held in June to explore some of the high interest topics. The first session was held at Green Acres Community Center and focused on indoor facilities and programs. The second was held at the Stacy C. Sherwood Center and focused on Van Dyck Park and other outdoor parks and facilities. During both sessions, participants engaged in hands-on discussions to identify priorities, and even try their hand at re-designing Van Dyck Park.

Results of the first four public workshops were shared at a public workshop in October 2012 along with the resultant vision, mission, goals and objectives.

The final public workshop was held in May 2014. During this session, the detailed Action Plan was communicated. This presentation outlined the detailed strategies recommended for achieving the goals and objectives.

Included below are detailed meeting notes from the Public Workshops. More detailed photographs, response cards, and workshop artifacts were provided to the Parks and Recreation Department.

Workshop #3, Green Acres Center, June 22, 2013

After the first two public workshops were held and results were tabulated from the stakeholder outreach meetings, several critical themes emerged. Two additional public workshops were scheduled for June that focused in on these topics to generate more detailed input from the community. Workshop #3 emphasized indoor recreation facilities and programs. The Parks and Recreation Director started the meeting with an introduction, followed by an introduction of the consultants. The consultants provided an overview of the strategic planning process, provided an inventory of the current indoor spaces and aquatic facilities (both in the City of Fairfax and in the immediate surrounding areas), and provided a summary of the input received pertaining to recreation centers, senior centers, and aquatic facilities. They also outlined the results of Workshops #1 and #2 of voting with dollars.

Following these introductory comments, the Consultants asked the larger group to break into three smaller discussion groups – indoor recreation center, senior indoor/outdoor aquatic facility. Each group was asked to identify priority programs and services that could/should be





provided at those facilities. The groups discussed these items and listed individual programs and services on index cards, which were then prioritized by their groups and shared with the overall group. The summarized results are as follows:

Senior Center Needs

- Therapy Pool
- Swimming Pool
- Bus
- Daily Lunch
- Multi-Lingual
- Access to Outdoor



Senior Center Improvements Needed

- Multi-Purpose Room
- Real gym
- Exercise room and programs at different levels
- Space for meetings

- Access with steps and ramps

Senior Center Programs

- Computer Room
- Diversified programming for bridge, cards, chess, lectures, aging assistance, and mentoring

The facilities should be located in a central location with transit accessible within a community where there are more dense populations

Aquatic Facilities

The group identified the following as critical needs/features for an aquatic facility. The numbers in parentheses indicate the top three priorities.

- Lap pool/ indoor (1)

- Lap pool outdoors
- Spa and hot tub- sauna
- Therapy pool

- Other issues included: limiting of the use of chlorine; and identification of the sensitivity to special needs persons regarding water temperatures. It was noted that one individual's spouse could not use most pools if the water was too warm.

The consultants then asked the participants to meet in their groups to discuss the following question:

 - Possible use of all the Paul VI
 - Two-story building is okay as long as there is an elevator



- Green Acres is a valuable asset
- Place higher priorities on the Seniors

Other issues identified in this meeting are as follows:

- More services are needed on the east side of the city

The consultants then asked the group, "What are your ideas for the best use and future of Green Acres?" The following items were identified:

- Hold onto the property, as it is very valuable
- Get money to do an analysis and architectural program for the building and site. Identify what level of additions, environmental analysis, etc. The study should have some metrics with it
- Consideration of traffic in the neighborhood
- Parking
- This is not a great location for many people
- Consider the impact of moving
- How badly does GMU want this property? What is the value of the property?
- Easier access here than downtown area
- About two-thirds of the ten acre site is fields
- Consider the demographics and that younger population wants more diversity
- None of us has enough information and we need to plan together
- It may cost more to renovate than to tear down and rebuild

Workshop #4, Stacy C. Sherwood Community Center, June 23, 2013, 1:00 p.m.

Workshop #4 was designed to focus on Van Dyck Park and other outdoor parks and facilities. The workshop was kicked off by the Parks and Recreation Director and then the planning consultants presented an overview of the Strategic Planning Process, an inventory of the existing outdoor facilities in the city and surrounding areas, as well as a summary of the public input received to date regarding parks and recreation facilities. The consultants identified the outdoor parks by their various categories, and illustrated that 82% of the residents are within a one-quarter mile or 5-minute walk from a park or school.



Following the discussion of the comments received, the group was asked if there were any additional items they would like to add to the list, and the following items were noted:



- Easy to maintain and clean restrooms in the parks
- School hand washing facilities have operational hand washing and needs to be considered in the parks
- Basketball court at Providence is needed
- Quality of a dog park. Must be clean, quality, have water supply
- Do it right
- Easy to maintain
- The litter in Van Dyck Park is a problem and there must be a better way to control the
- Drinking fountains versus water bottles. The drinking fountains are better everywhere
- Fountains accessible to pets should also be provided
- A model airplane area and a remote control car area would be ideal
- The City is promoted as a City of Trees-become that. Landscaping should use the same old disease-resistant elm trees. Map the trees by species and link within the school education program and historic link. Use historic trees with signage.
- Soccer
- City park for residents Have fees or tournament facilities we have to pay for affordability.
- Move the pavilion at Providence
- Fencing around the basketball courts
- Community facility near School Street in West Fairfax
- More bicycle trails and better maintenance
- Trail map is hard to read and needs to be updated
- Develop splash pads as gathering places
- Multi-use covered facility could be developed which could be used for in-line hockey, volleyball, tennis, basketball and other activities. This would be smart planning. The empty K-Mart facility is one possibility.
- Rugby is a very strong-growing sport, need to add lines to the artificial turf fields given the current demand. Rugby also needs dedicated space. Lanier is where they used to play, but cannot anymore.

The consultants then divided the overall group into smaller groups – one group was tasked with "redesigning" Van Dyck Park and the other group focused discussion on any other general comments regarding outdoor parks and facilities. The majority of participants participated in the activity of "redesigning" Van Dyck Park. Each small group was provided a scaled map and aerial photograph of Van Dyck Park and templates of potential park facilities they could place on the site and begin a dialog to improve and upgrade this park. Examples of some of the "master plans" created by participants are featured below.















Some of the additional comments generated in the other group discussion are outlined below:

- Roller-skating rink at Green Acres Park on the inside area would be great
- Green Acres needs to be more like Oak Marr. Needs inline skating area, pavilions, and concerts.
- Keep Green Acres
- Amphitheater- if you do it, do it downtown
- Special events are great but need to be jazzed up a bit
- Outdoor theater




- Children's summer program of art that is affordable
- Woodson High School-Pursue multi-use
- Additional input
- If you do not inline skate, collaborate with the skate park

- Look at the best area for various use and evaluate all parks and recommend the best area


CHILDREN'S INPUT

Our Parks, Our Future Web Based Community Engagement

In an effort to engage all City residents, the City implemented an online civic engagement tool that enabled residents to provide input regardless of where they were located, what time of day it was, and do so in more than 75 languages. The site, Our Parks, Our Future was designed explicitly for the City of Fairfax and provided a forum for residents to submit ideas and recommendations, react to potential solutions, provide input on priorities, and engage in conversation with City leaders and others, and stay up-to-date on the planning process. The web site was managed and updated by the planning consultants and staff. A total of 22,623 page views, 3,168 unique visitors, and 317 active participants were involved. The average age of participants was 48 years old, with the vast majority residing in the 22030 zip code.




Age and Gender Distribution

The figure below outline the characteristics of the average visitor to the Our Parks, Our Future website.



Community Attitude and Interest Survey

The City of Fairfax partnered with the Center for Social Science Research within the College of Humanities and Social Sciences of George Mason University (GMU) to design, conduct, analyze and report on a statistically valid survey distributed to a random sampling of City households. The survey was designed to identity satisfaction levels for current programs, facilities and events, identify unmet needs for facilities and programs, identify current usage of parks, and establish priorities for parks and recreation functions. GMU mailed postcards and printed surveys to 2,500 City households, providing respondents with the opportunity to complete the survey online or via the hard copy survey. The 20 percent response rate goal was exceeded, as 668 responses were received representing a 23 percent response rate. One of the greatest benefits of the random sampling survey is the ability to reach non-users or inactive users of the park and recreation program. This target population was likely not to be represented at the public workshops and stakeholder meetings.

The Center for Social Science Research (CSSR) is a multidisciplinary research center within the College of Humanities and Social Sciences of George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia. The Center draws on faculty from various disciplines—sociology, political science, psychology, communication, and others—who bring their expertise to bear on some of the most pressing social, behavioral, and political problems facing contemporary society. The CSSR provides a platform that brings together social science theories and methods to conduct state-of-the-art research on important social problems and basic social science questions. Studies employ a range of quantitative and qualitative research methods including survey research, focus groups, interviews, analysis based on leading social indicators and the exploration of virtual world environments. Particular emphasis is placed on:

Survey Research

CSSR operates a survey research lab specializing in web-based survey instruments and Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI). Formerly the Northern Virginia Survey Research Laboratory, the survey center has been in operation since 1987. The recently upgraded lab has 15 PC-based interviewing stations with a fully featured, webbased CATI system, which allows for sophisticated questionnaire design, including skips and branching, randomization of question or response order, piping, voice capture, sample and quote management, including scheduling callbacks, recording call attempts, automatic time zone adjustment, and quality assurance, including productivity reports and call monitoring.

Community Participation and Action-Based Research

CSSR is committed to working with students, residents, organizations, municipalities, counties, and other groups to assist in the improvement of the quality of life and living situations of Northern Virginia's diverse populations and communities. CSSR is strengthening its community-university partnerships by using a community-based strategy that combines research, action, collaboration and capacity building. CSSR strives to engage the "community" through an entire research and implementation process including problem identification, research instrument development, data collection, data analysis, data interpretation, presentation of findings, and the implementation of action plans. We believe that by working on an issue collaboratively, each partner brings different skills, strengths, perspectives, and resources that when combined, can more effectively meet the goals of the community. On behalf of the community, the University brings resources, expertise in research methods, data collection and analysis, and training that builds capacity while enabling groups to meet their long term goals.

Digital Social Science Research


CSSR has begun a new research program in the exploration of Virtual Worlds, immersive, online, 3D graphic social environments. CSSR aims to become a leader in the innovative adaptation of surveys, in conducting socialpsychological experiments, and in educating and training to these new environments.

CSSR is a member of the National Consortium of Social Science Research Centers and Institutes, the Association of Academic Survey Research Organizations, and the Virtual Worlds Consortium.

1. Survey data collection methodology

A random sample of Fairfax City residents was purchased from a national list vendor, Scientific Telephone Samples. This sample included names, addresses and telephone numbers of 2,500 City residents, as well as age and ethnicity of head of household. A multi-mode approach was used to collect data. First, postcards were sent to each address. The postcard introduced the survey and included a link to an online version of the survey at http://cssr.gmu.edu. Residents were informed that they would also receive a mail version of the survey, if they chose not to complete the survey online. The postcard also included a unique survey registration number that residents were asked to enter at the start of the survey. Two weeks later, after culling out those residents who had already completed the survey based on their survey registration numbers, each address was called and reminded about the online survey. They were also notified at that time that the paper version of the survey would go in the mail shortly. At this point approximately 215 surveys had been completed online and paper versions were mailed to the remaining 2,285 addresses. A prepaid return envelope was included with the survey. As of September 20, 2013 an additional 242 surveys had been received by mail yielding a preliminary realized sample of 457 and a response rate of approximately 18.3%.

Listed samples tend to overrepresent older respondents so the initial sample was supplemented after September 20, 2013 with and additional sample of all 408 listed households in the City with a head of household under the age of forty. As of October 10, 2013 there were a total of 585 complete surveys (response rate = 20.1%) and a total of 668 complete and partial surveys (response rate = 23.0%). In 265 cases the responses could be linked to a specific household address. The map below indicates that responses were provided from across the City, while statistical tests comparing those households with addresses to those without indicate no significant differences in the use and intensity of use of City facilities and programs.






City of Fairfax Parks and Facilities Visited by Fairfax City Residents in Last 12 Months (weighted)




School Outdoor Athletic Fields Visited by Fairfax City Residents in Last 12 Months




Other Area Parks and Facilities Visited by Fairfax City Residents in Last 12 Months



Fairfax City Residents' Participation in Special Events or Cultural Arts Activities in the Last 12 Months






Level of Support among City Residents for Actions to Improve City Parks and Recreation **Services**

Organizations that Fairfax City Residents Use for Parks and Recreation Programs and Facilities









Percent of Fairfax City Residents Who Need Various Types of Programs








How Fairfax City Residents Learn about Recreation Facilities and Activities



How Long Fairfax City Residents are Willing to Drive to Attend Programs or Facilities (weighted)







How Respondents Would Allocate \$100 Among Various Parks and Recreation Facilities in the City of Fairfax (weighted)




